Environment the next target for United Church moderator

Rev. Walter Farquharson's smile is slightly strained as he explains, yet again, how the United Church is faring in the aftermath of the storm over homosexual ordination.

"The United Church has gone through some very difficult times and it's forced congregations to look very closely at who they are," said Farquharson, who is halfway through his two-year term as leader of Canada's largest Protestant denomination.

"Sometimes congregations have shrunk a bit, but also, some are experiencing growth. Some parishioners are coming into the United Church who admire the church's willingness to take on difficult issues."

Farquharson, 54, was elected

moderator at last year's General Council meeting, partly because of his ability to smooth the angry divisions that erupted over the issue of homosexual ordination.

In 1988, the church accepted a policy recognizing the rights of all people, regardless of sexual orientation, to be eligible to become ministers.

That statement was reaffirmed last year, but not before entire congregations left the church.

Farquharson said the debate made many members stop and think.

"We had to really deal with some feelings and emotions and attitudes that we didn't like to admit we had. Many of us had to come to terms with real fears."

Now Farquharson — who commutes each month from his home and parishes in Saskatchewan to head office in Toronto — wants

the 829,000-member church to get on with other issues.

The one closest to his heart is raising awareness of the environment.

Raised on a seed farm near Rosetown, Sask., Farquharson said he remembers taking long walks in the fields with his father, a man he says was an environmentalist long before the term became fashionable.

"There was a real sense that the earth is never ours. We look after it for the next generation."

Farquharson, one of six children, said he originally wanted to go into horticulture.

But as a young teen, small town boredom sent him to the local United Church for church-sponsored events with other youths.

After graduation, Farquharson spent a summer working at a local church before deciding to go into the seminary at the University of Saskatchewan in Saskatoon, where he graduated with a doctorate in divinity.

But after a year of working as an assistant minister in a church in Edinburgh, Scotland, he and his wife Joan, a registered nurse, came home.

In 1961, the couple and the first of their four children settled in rural Saskatchewan near the Manitoba border, where Farquharson has ministered to three area churches ever since. He also spent 14 years as a teacher in the local high school.

Farquharson, well-known for the more than 100 hymns he has written for the church, went on to serve as president of the Saskatchewan division before becoming moderator last year.
